Jayne H. Plank Remembers – Part 2

(The first part of this article describes Jayne Plank's memories of visiting Kensington as a child in the 1930s and living here with her family in the 1960s and 1970s. Jayne H. Plank served on Kensington's Town Council from 1967 to 1974. She the first woman elected mayor of Kensington and served four terms from 1974 to 1982.)

The Plank family moved to Kensington in 1962. When the house next door was to be rezoned for 7 townhouses, one for each daughter, Jayne got involved in Kensington politics. "One end of the project would have been in our living room!" she remembers. "If you don't like what they do, you either step up, or sit down!"

Plank's husband was a builder in Virginia. She would help him with zoning questions. They made sure that there was no mixing: Maryland was for her, Virginia for him.

At the time in 1968, the council was getting ready to create the new master plan, which was finished in 1977.

Plank explains that there was no protection in place yet for historic properties, no historic zoning or registration to encourage people "to save what we had." Plank wrote a story, "Old Town Kensington: Restoring 1870," for the realtor magazine in 1977, the year that the Kensington Historical Society was created to preserve Kensington's small town character with a garden city history.

The Maryland National Park and Planning Commission identified the Town of Kensington (site 31-6) as historic in their 1976 atlas of historic sites in Montgomery County.

The town records of that time were unfortunately lost. When Plank became mayor she made sure to create reading files of "every piece of material she ever had."

Saving the Noyes Library was a big project. Jayne recounts the story of Noyes Library: "It was our library, named for Crosby Noyes, who was the first editor of the Washington Star. He donated the books — that's how we had books. The charge was one dollar per year to join and that paid for the part-time librarian."


When the Kensington Park Library was opened in 1969, Noyes Library was closed. "I just loved that library. When I was a little girl in DC we had a children's library. I thought it was an opportunity to have the only children's library in the whole state of Maryland!"

Checking a binder of records, she points out the letter to the county council, and the petition presenting a thousand names on 54 pages. "We got the signatures in one weekend and they approved it!" On April 27, 1970, it was the unanimous vote of the County Council to turn Noyes into a children's library.

"They wanted to give the library back to the Town. Well, if the Town takes it over, it is costing us money." An endowment paid for the renovation and "the county gave us Mrs. Cohen. She was our first librarian and she was wonderful."

Mrs. Cohen created Grandparent Suitcases. "When you had children coming, you could check out a suitase and it would have everything to entertain the children." There were suitcases geared to different ages. In the 1980s they started using backpacks instead of suitcases.

"I had two children while I was in office, and never missed a meeting. We had meetings on a regular basis, so I could plan it a little better. I kept a box of toys in a corner of the office." The youngest of Jayne's five boys was born in 1972.

Flinn Park was established across from the Kensington Post Office,. The Park is named for Nancy ("Nannie") Rutherford Flinn, a popular teacher of Kensington children from 1919 to 1953. After Mrs. Flinn died, the house stood empty and became an eyesore. "The town bought it for \$31,000."

Howard Avenue Park was dedicated in 1971. County Council President Ida Mae Garrett was there, and Jack Hewitt from Park & Planning. "People used to call it Doctors Park, because two doctors had their office there." Originally the building was the home of the Montgomery Press. Cornelius Clum, who had reported out west, was the paper's editor from 1895 to 1935.

In 1972, the Mayor of Kensington, England, came over on the occasion of Queen Elizabeth's silver wedding anniversary. "They brought us a rosebush and all kinds of things. The rosebush was planted at the library."

That year Kensington Parkway collapsed, right by Littledale Road where the creek goes under the Parkway. The creek was diverted at some point. When and why that was done, Jayne was never able to discover.

In 1973 the Town purchased the Armory for \$65,000 from the Board of Public Works. "In one of the old handwritten minutes books from the 1920s, it said that the Armory title was okay, but it also showed the first right of refusal: Public Works had to offer it to the Town first, before they could sell it to anybody." The Armory was dedicated on October 3, 1976, as permanent Town Hall and Community Center.

There was the Kensington house tour, Bike Kensington Day in 1976 and the "fight over the potbellied stove in the railroad station!"

"Gaithersburg had talked to B&O and got them to agree to let them have Kensington's pot-bellied stove. That stove was working and was the only heat in the Kensington Station!" In time it was agreed - the stove would stay!

At the dedication of the Gaithersburg station, Mayor Plank presented them with a little pot-bellied stove in a box. "I had fun," she chuckles.

In 1977 the new sector plan added the transitional zoning and created the historic district. The plan to split the two rail lines and put the metro up the middle would have obliterated Metropolitan and Howard Avenues.

"The Town Council and Mayor were all volunteer. That meant your own car, your own baby-sitting fees. 1 had a part-time clerk. At tax time we brought on somebody half time; we did all our taxes in-house. For the Town and the elections."

"I had a ball. I loved being mayor of Kensington!"
