The Kensington Volunteer Fire Department Centennial Celebration!

Come out to celebrate the 100th anniversary of our dedicated Kensington Volunteer Fire Department (KVFD), one of the oldest and most cherished institutions in town.

In January, KVFD's centennial events kicked off with a fascinating talk by KVFD historian, Juan Bofill, at Kensington Historical Society, about the earliest years of fire fighting in Kensington. When Kensington was incorporated in 1894, the town had unpaved roads, well water, no public sewer system, no electricity, and no fire department. Townspeople organized "bucket brigades" to combat occasional fires.

On October 26, 1899, around 6 a.m., a large fire was discovered in the Press Building. The fire

spread to Town Hall, then housed in a commercial building with a grocery store and pharmacy. The Press Building and Town Hall were destroyed; only a piano was saved. Mrs. Brown's millinery store was covered with wet blankets and spared.

Cornelius Clum, owner and publisher of the Montgomery County Press, called for action. That night at the Noyes Library townspeople elected Leslie W. Maxson chief of the Kensington Fire Company.

In 1922, friction with the Town government about use of the fire truck for training and outside town limits led Eugene J.C. Raney, joined by others, to form a separate company.

They purchased a Dodge truck from Reed Brothers in Rockville. Jacobs Brothers in Gaithersburg fit a custom fire body to the truck. To raise money, the volunteers held carnivals.

Relations with the Town Council improved, and the Fire Department was incorporated in 1925. After years of planning and saving, property was bought at the corner of what is now Connecticut Avenue and Plyers Mill Road. In 1946 the cornerstone was laid and the new firehouse opened: Old Town Kensington Station 5.

Development boomed after World War II. Three additional fire houses were opened to serve the fast-growing surrounding area: Station 18 Glenmont, in 1953 at Georgia Avenue and Mason Street; Station 21 The Village, in 1962, at Veirs Mill and Gaynor Roads; and Station 25 Aspen Hill, in 1978, at Connecticut Avenue and Bel Pre Road.

Today the KVFD is one of the largest volunteer fire departments in Montgomery County and Maryland, and handles about 21,000 calls for emergency service a year.

Recently, when severe heart palpitations woke a neighbor up before dawn, she called 911. "Within five minutes, a team was at my house!" They were able to get a rhythm in the ambulance, so she was able to be diagnosed. Though living by herself, she feels safe and cared for, thanks to the prompt and expert response.

A range of community events like summer movie nights, chili cook-offs, Santa's fire truck neighborhood visit, and more, raise community spirit as well as funds for up-to-date equipment and training.

The Kensington Historical Society joyfully shared town history, while the volunteers from the Noyes Children's Library Foundation sold many colorful T-shirts. At a low table, wooden trains cruised along the tracks propelled by our youngest train trackers, and the scavenger hunt was hit.
