### Neighbors for Over Half a Century

"There were no streets when we moved here, just dirt roads and wooden sidewalks," says Mrs. Crossette from her settee.

"There was no community," adds Mrs. Cleveland sitting beside her, "You would get stuck in your own yard with mud."

Since 1936, these women have lived side by side in two of the first houses built in Chevy Chase View.

Thinking together, they recall the name of the man who first showed them around Chevy Chase View. "It was Mr. Martin, wasn't it?" asks Mrs. Crossette.

"He had the whole block," agrees Mrs. Cleveland. "Martin was the one telling us we were going to have sewers, we were going to have streets. We didn't have electricity then..."

"You didn't have water!" Mrs. Crossette interrupts. "You had to get it from the people in back of you..."

"At first..."

"At first, yes."

"When you were building your house."

When I remark on how they finish each other's sentences, they both laugh. "That's what comes from living next door for sixty years," says Mrs. Cleveland.





Flipping through her photo album, Mrs. Crossette finds a picture of the two couples when they were new neighbors. It is a group shot taken at a hot dog roast at the Clevelands' house. "See the newspaper on the floor there? They hadn't finished the floor. They were living in the house while building it." In the photograph we see the two ladies trying to hide their pregnant bellies behind their husbands, who are acting silly and holding little dolls up to the camera.

Another of the square black and white snapshots portrays the entire postal district of Chevy Chase View — six mailboxes on the corner of Summit and Saul. The ladies recall their daily trips to check the mail and the long walks into Kensington to take their children to school. The dirt road they once walked along has since become the wide, well-paved street we are familiar with today.

Twenty-five houses line the lane now, but when the women first arrived there was only one other house in sight. Mrs. Crossette's husband, George, one of the early members of the Chevy Chase View Council, was instrumental in the development of that road. He worked to get the W.P.A. grants used to build the first proper roads.

When she first arrived in town, Mrs. Cleveland thought that church might be the place to meet other Kensington residents. "The first church I went to, the Methodist Church, had seven people at the service. So next I tried the Presbyterians and there were nine in that congregation, and then I went to the Baptist Church and there were eighteen people there and there wasn't anywhere left to go. And then three new young ministers cam and all of a sudden we had 400 members."

The women found other ways to socialize. "My husband was a reserve officer and had to go away one weekend a month, and I had a friend whose husband drove a bus. She would come to keep me company as I had a baby," explains Mrs. Cleveland. "That's how the Sewing Club started, as she was a Kensington girl and knew lots of girls. We all brought whatever we wanted to work on but finally we didn't work at all, we just talked. And joked, lots of jokes...." "And always ate," Mrs. Crossette reminds her, "refreshments were very important."

Mrs. Crossette also started one of the first Brownie and Girl Scout troops in Chevy Chase View. S'mores haven't changed, she reckons, referring to the graham cracker, chocolate, and marshmallow combination that is still popular at Girl Scout cookouts.

Over the past sixty years, Mrs. Crossette's garden has become a mosaic of azaleas. Like a soft mountain range along the borders of the yard and circling the large ash tree, they continue to bloom.

Green thumbs seem to be the rule for the Chevy Chase View community of today. The old trees provide a lush backdrop for the flowering plants that the locals cultivate in abundance.

Today there are joggers beating the same path that Mrs. Crossette and Mrs. Cleveland once walked down to get the mail. A Porsche sits in a driveway where once sat an Edsel. The azaleas, however, are perennial and return each year the same in the garden of Mrs. Crossette and her neighborhood, Mrs. Cleveland.


