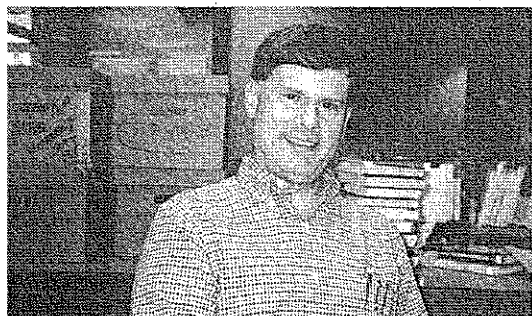
Cause for Celebration

Kensington Park Library Reopens Monday, October 17 at 12:30 p.m.

Special Reopening Celebration Saturday, November 5

Get ready to explore the newly-renovated Kensington Park Library on Opening Day, Monday, October 17 starting at 12: 30 p.m. Keith Fleeman, the new head librarian, has been with Montgomery County libraries since 1982 and was previously head librarian at Little Falls Library in Bethesda. Along with unpacking boxes and organizing materials, he and the entire library staff are all set to serve the Kensington community and nearby neighbors with "better than ever" programs and services.

Children's programming will be one of the main focuses of our community library. The new children's librarian is Linda Swanson. Younger children can enjoy scheduled storytimes with their parents, as well as regular trips to pick out picture books and storybooks to enjoy at home, while older children can ask library staff for help with those tough school assignments, papers, and reports.



Going one step beyond the other libraries, the Kensington Park Library will have several personal computers, complete with inkjet or laser printers, for use by both children and adults. Also in the early planning stages are connections with on-line services such as Internet.

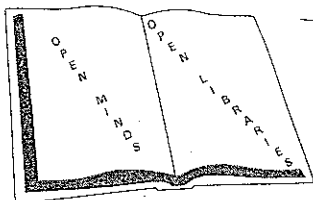

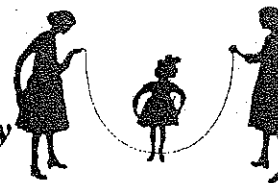

A Rewarding Opportunity

If you are a senior adult, 55 and over, and want to work with children while earning money, take part in Grandcare. Interages, Montgomery County's nonprofit intergenerational center located in Kensington, is providing an opportunity for you to take part in a program that puts seniors to work in licensed child care centers. Now in its eighth year, this program continues to jointly meet the needs of the senior and youth population by pairing an able work force with a much-needed resource—child care.

As program coordinator Harolyn B. Cohen notes, too often, in our area, children live far away from their grandparents and miss out on the wonderful relationship of interacting with the senior generation. Now, after a three-day training and orientation program provided by Interages, seniors are prepared to fill the role of part-time and substitute workers. After the training, employment is contracted directly between individual child care centers and the workers.

What a Difference 100 Years Makes

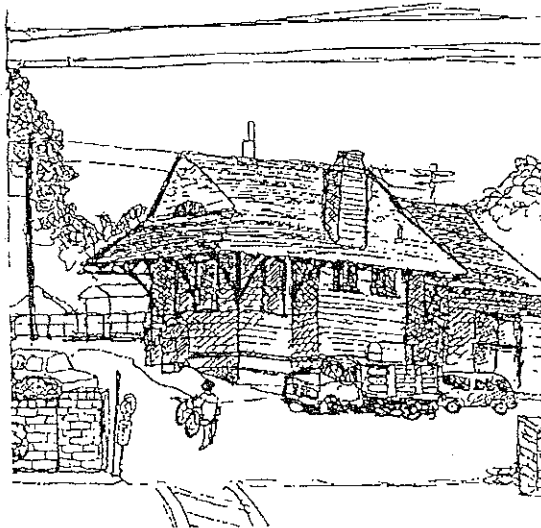
By the looks of the Kensington train station building, you may not think much has changed in the past hundred years, but some interesting facts about the railroad's history may surprise you.

Passenger service through Kensington actually began in 1873, 21 years before the town was even established. Known as Knowles Station back then, the stop was part of a 42-mile route from Point of Rocks to Washington. City commuters were encouraged to build their homes on the Knowles farm near the train station. This growing settlement later became the Town of Kensington that we are so fond of today.

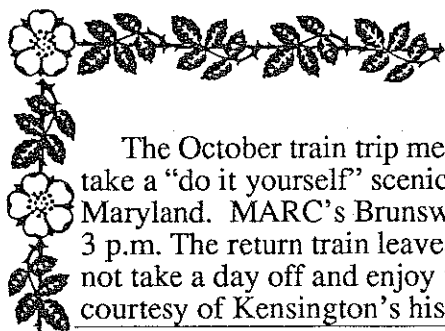
Back in 1894, the one-way fare from Kensington to Union Station was only 35 cents. Compared to today's cost of \$3.00 that's almost an 800% increase! The number of trains serving Kensington station has decreased from 12 in 1894 to 6 today—five into Washington each weekday morning and one in the afternoon, with most of the return trips in the late afternoon. Even the present track elevation has changed with time—it's at least two feet higher than it was in 1894. This is caused by routine track work maintenance.

The present Kensington station was built in 1891, making it the second oldest B&O station still in active use in Montgomery County. This summer, you've probably noticed work crews busy at the Kensington station. They have been restoring the station to its original state. This fall, they will begin work to improve the Kensington parking area.

MARC rail took over service of the old B&O in 1974, with 10 of the original 20 remaining Montgomery County stations still operating today. With commuters still using trains to get to work, the 103 year old Kensington train station is a daily reminder of Kensington's rich history.



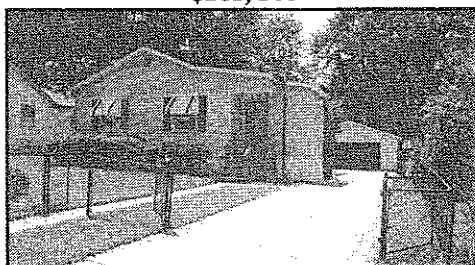

A Scenic Train Trip

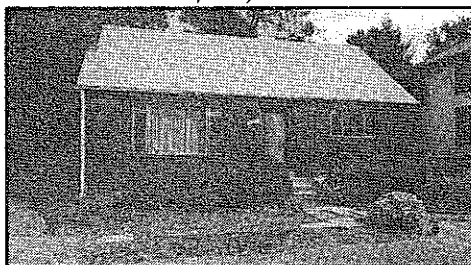
