HELPING THE COMMUNITY Profile of an Artist

A beautiful full-color greeting card depicting the Noyes Children's Library in Kensington is helping raise the funds needed each year for the library. Artist Judy Hank Henn, the creator of the cameo shown on the card, moved to Kensington five years ago. She loves the uniqueness of the town and its homey wood frame library with the owl design over the door. Noyes Library, she comments, "looks different every season." She has one of the closest views, because she and her family live in a Queen Anne house nearby.

Judy has also been active in other efforts to raise funds for the library, which has received national attention as the first public library in the Washington area and now the only one devoted totally to children. In addition to the greeting cards, she also designed the T-shirts that raise funds for the nonprofit Noyes Library Foundation. And she has created a banner to represent Kensington.

Judy suggested the slogan that was chosen as the theme for the Kensington

Centennial:

Where the train still stops And the people still walk.

Judy has been involved in art in many ways. The daughter of an Air Force pilot, she met her husband while working on her master's degree at Harvard. She has designed furniture and now particularly enjoys creating paintings of houses and gardens. Historical and local scenes are her favorite subjects. So is Cape May, which gives her a special sense of time and place.

Her paintings are on display at the Noyes Children's Library. The greeting cards are also available there as well as at Johnson's Flower and Garden Center in

Kensington. The T-Shirts are available at Bonjour Kids.

In addition to her efforts on behalf of the Noyes Library and her adopted town of Kensington, Judy is busy renovating her home and raising her family. As she looks





to the future, one possibility might be to illustrate children's books.
Until then, she is just enjoying the people and activities of Kensington. 1.

A Book From the "Korners"

Nearly 2 years ago George Woolley and four other Kensington business people met at American Country Crafts to discuss how to help Kensington and the people who work and live there. They started a nonprofit organization, the Kensington Korners Business District Association. The KKBDA group has grown rapidly. It has sponsored events that resulted in substantial donations to the Muscular Dystrophy Association and flood relief in the midwest.

Today the Kensington Korners Business District Association has 85 members and produces and distributes a directory to homes and businesses in the area. KKBDA has sponsored a moon bounce, an indoor-outdoor craft fair, and other fundraising activities during Kensington's Labor Day celebrations.

The association also plans to take part in the Centennial Celebration events. One of its special projects is a limited edition book on the history of the Town of Kensington. With photographs and maps from 1894 to the present, this 96-page hardcover collector's edition will also include information on the Town's history. For orders postmarked by March 31, the special advance price is \$10.45 (includes tax), with proceeds going for the Kensington Centennial. During April and May, the price will be \$16.75.



From Armory to Town Hall to Community Center

The big brick building on Mitchell Street in the center of the Town of Kensington has had different functions over the years. In an earlier newsletter, we described its beginnings as a National Guard Armory in 1927, its service as the home of the Kensington Volunteer Fire Department, and its transformation in the 1970's to Kensington's Town Hall. It still is the Town Hall, but its name has changed to reflect its ever-widening role in the community. Now called the Kensington Community Center, this statuesque building serves a wide array of groups and purposes.

Dance groups, Boy Scouts, and Girl Scouts—to name just a few of the community groups—hold meetings and functions there. The spacious room upstairs has been turned into an art gallery for the "Paint the Town" competitions. Other possibilities are also in the works. A bridge league will be setting up a schedule. A lunch program for senior citizens is another possibility. And in March, the Center is hosting the Town Talent Show, one of the Centennial Celebration events.

Plans are also under way to upgrade the interior and to add more lights outside. And at any time, the Town offices downstairs can keep you posted about the events going on in the community.




