

A KENSINGTON SCRAP BOOK

McKeever's Ice Cream. The trolley from Washington. Phil McCurdy's plumbing business. The DGS (District Grocery Store). Trowbridge's Drug Store. Farmers' Bank and Trust Co. The Kensington Bank.

For many long-time Kensington area residents, these words evoke images of a small town far from the hustle of big city Washington. For Gordon Luckett, now president of Equitable Federal Savings Bank, they bring back the time when he graduated from Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School and took his first job at the Kensington branch of Farmers' Bank and Trust in 1947.


Born in West Virginia, Mr. Luckett came to the Washington area as an infant, living first in the District near the Washington Cathedral and, later, moving to a house on the corner of Fawcett and Mitchell Streets in Kensington.


During high school Gordon Luckett worked as an usher at the old Avalon Theatre in Silver Spring, a popular spot with its "Air Cooled" climate and "hot" movies starring Gary Cooper, Clark Gable, Susan Hayward, and Humphrey Bogart. In those days, Luckett recalls, news serials and 7-minute short subjects were standard, feature movies were a lot shorter than they are today, double features were common -- and admission was 25 cents. A uniformed doorman adorned the entrance and the ushers (of which he was one) escorted customers to their plush velour seats.

As a teller at Farmers' Bank and Trust's Kensington branch, Mr. Luckett had a boss named Douglas Birchby, the "Cashier" (now called a manager). Mr. Luckett didn't aspire to be a banker in those days, he just liked working for and with "nice people" in a community business. Luckett studied finance at Montgomery College while he worked and interrupted his early years at the bank for four years of military service.

In 1951, Gordon Luckett and Jean Kirby married. They had met in high school when she ran the candy counter at the Apex Theater in Spring Valley. Mr. Luckett remembers how he and a friend at the bank looked forward to a far-off time when they would earn the princely sum of \$100 a week, the better to support their growing families and afford their own homes.

In his early banking days, Luckett recalls, bank loans were given to local residents of good character and sound plans for the money they borrowed. This simple process was only possible in a small community where everyone knew everyone else. Recognizing the important growth and change in financial institutions today, Luckett still works hard to maintain that sense of community he fondly remembers: he still prefers to think of his customers as individuals and he is proud that he has people on his staff fluent in many languages and knowledgeable about the needs of individuals from a variety of backgrounds.

Recently, Mr. Luckett shared his recollections and some of the photos he has collected of old Kensington and nearby areas.

Rose Gardening Tips



Here are some hints about roses from Gordon Luckett, President of Equitable FSB and an avid rose gardener in his leisure time.

Hybrid tea roses with the AARS (All-American Rose Selection) Award usually do better than most.

A good planting hole is the key ingredient. For each rose bush you plant: Dig a pit 18 inches deep and layer in 2 inches of small rocks and 6 inches of sand. Top off with 10 inches of a "light" soil mix of topsoil, peat moss, and sand for planting the rose bush.

Water and fertilize thoroughly and regularly. Spray weekly with a commercial fungicide and with a solution to control aphids. Because of these critical weekly ministerings, one rose "garden" of a dozen roses is easier to manage than a few roses randomly planted around a whole yard.

In fall, cut back the canes a bit and add mulch for wind protection.

In spring, prune bush back to 7 to 12 inches high.




