Temple Emanuel's New Rain Garden

Rain gardens are a growing trend as homeowners look for environmentally friendly ways to deal with rainwater effectively and prevent soil erosion and pollution of downstream water sources.

Religious congregations often oversee large properties and are getting in on the action digging rain gardens—sunken areas where native flowers and bushes can be planted below the surrounding ground to absorb excessive water—and installing conservation landscaping—where hard surfaces and regular lawns can be replaced with native plants and shrubs.

Temple Emanuel has occupied a 5-acre site on Connecticut Avenue in Kensington just north of the Beltway for almost 65 years of its 70-year existence. Last November two dozen volunteers installed a 300 square foot rain garden adjoined by 400 square feet of conservation landscaping.

The road to a Temple Emanuel rain garden took quite a few twists because of the pandemic. Alison Trackman, Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School student and then-Temple member, first suggested the rain garden in June 2020 and graduated before the project got rolling.

Trackman was part of the initial steps, which involved identifying potential sites and digging a two-foot-deep hole on the site to test if it would drain within 24 hours as required. Alison Trackman also prepared an initial design for the planting of flowers and planned to bring fellow students on board from the environmental club she started at Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School.

The Temple board under now-Rabbi Emeritus Warren Stone endorsed the project to deal with flooding and icing on the front driveway in a way consistent with the congregation's longtime environmental commitment.

After Alison graduated, the idea was carried on by members of the Temple's Building and Grounds Committee and Luke Jessup, owner of Father Nature Restorative Landscaping in Wheaton.

Jessup is a rainscape veteran and has created many in the county. Temple Emanuel heard of him because of his work at the neighboring Warner Memorial Presbyterian Church.

Jessup's goal is to bring together the Temple community with the shared value of "continuing to make their religious home a space that improves the natural land it sits on." By reducing the erosive impact of rainwater runoff, and planting an integrated ecosystem filled with native plants, the garden will restore groundwater reserves and provide food and shelter for insects, birds, and other wildlife. And it will welcome visitors as they enter the synagogue!



The daylong planting took place on a blustery Sunday in November, the coldest day up to that date. Volunteers sported hats, heavy coats, and work gloves. Rabbi Emeritus Warren Stone and Rabbi Adam Rosenwasser gathered workers for prayers, with everyone singing a "Shehecheyanu" blessing, given when something is done for the first time

The planting was made possible by a rebate offered by the Montgomery County Department of Environmental Protection RainScapes Rewards Rebate Program. Property owners can apply for a rebate to install rain gardens, rain barrels, conservation landscaping, and other approved projects that help control stormwater. The Rainscape Program is open to properties in Montgomery County outside the municipalities of Rockville, Gaithersburg and Takoma Park. Caring for our planet and preserving and protecting it for future generations is one of the key traditions of Judaism, and the rain garden is a wonderful example of turning that into reality.

Now Temple Emanuel is looking forward excitedly to the garden's first blooming this spring! A ribbon-cutting ceremony is anticipated to be held on May 21.


