



Come to the Centennial Celebration Saturday, May 7th, 1994

Where It All Began

THEN...

• November 13, 1893. Kensington citizens met at the Noyes library to talk over, as the "Kensington" letter in *The Evening Star* put it, "the general interests of this place and the probable incorporation of the town." They appointed a committee made up of Drs. Detrick and Lewis and Messrs Manakee, Dorian, and Ogden "to consider the propriety of incorporation and report at the next meeting. The committee were also instructed to look after the putting up of additional lamps and laying of board walks."

• December 29 and 30th, 1893. Kensington citizens met at the Noyes Library to discuss the pros and cons of incorporation. They unanimously agreed to incorporate a square-mile area with the railroad station nearly at the center. Agreeing that the town would be governed by a mayor and council, to be elected the following May 7th, they appointed a committee chaired by B.H. Warner and including W.H. Mannakee, William Terrell, Dr. R.B. Detrick, and Thomas R. Martin to present the Maryland legislature with a petition asking for incorporation.

January 1894. Senator Hattersly W. Talbott was in charge of the bill to incorporate Kensington.

February 20th. The Maryland Senate passed a bill to incorporate Kensington.

March 29. Thomas R. Martin and William Terrill went before the legislature to support the Kensington bill. The bill passed the House of Delegates.

April 2, 1894. The Evening Star reported that State Senator H.S. Talbott has notified the committee of the passage of the bill of incorporation of Kensington by the house.

May 1, 1894. According to *The Evening Star*, "Dr. R.B. Detrick has positively declined the nomination for the council and refuses to take any office under the municipal government of Kensington."

May 5, 1894. "Upon the urgent request of friends Dr. R.B. Detrick has consented to serve as mayor of Kensington, if elected."

May 7, 1894. Kensington's first election. The voting takes place at the Fawcett House, and Thomas R. Martin is elected mayor. The council members are William H. Mannakee, J. Howard Fishback, Mr. Dorsey, and George Peter.

The Noyes Library was where the Kensington Founders met back in 1893 and 1894. The first public library in the entire Washington metropolitan region, it's now the only library devoted totally to the needs of children. It is supported through a unique public-private partnership that combines county support with the funds raised by the Noyes Children's Library Foundation. Here's where you come in—help support this regional treasure by joining in the evening of fun and fundraising.

The auction will feature unique clocks designed by prominent national and local architects, artists, and designers. Included will be works by local artist Judy Hanks Henn and nationally known craftsman Daniel Hale, whose pieces are shown at the Whitney Museum in New York City. Jana Coe and Dey Mathews are arranging the light buffet, dessert, wine, and champagne. Fiona Morris is in charge of the program layout. Kathy Cowan is handling the invitations.
